Great Arrests

I would like to share with you two great arrests this week.

The first has to do with suspects entering Walgreens and CVS stores. They would enter, fill a bag up, threaten the employees (making it a robbery) and flee the store. We believe the suspects were responsible for several of these robberies.

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This week, after a robbery on Drumm Street, Officers Jim Horan and Kevin Gil spotted the suspect vehicle and took four suspects into custody. A tremendous arrest!

The second arrest happened yesterday when four suspects were in a vehicle when one exited and robbed a Venezuelan tourist at Pier 33. Officers responded to the area and saw the suspect vehicle. There was a short pursuit by Officers Vanessa Johnson and Jonathan Sylvester which ended when the suspects crashed into a police van driven by Officer Vincent Busalacchi. The suspects were taken into custody by these officers as well as Officer Nicholas Stewart and Chris Sabella. No one was injured and all the properties were recovered. Great work!

Auto Burglary Case

I would like to conclude this week's newsletter by thanking the District Attorney's Office and the courts for a conviction and sentencing in a case. As I write this newsletter, I am listening to my police radio of an auto burglary in progress on the 900 block of Lombard and reminds me of the importance of addressing this issue.

A prolific auto burglar was arrested last year at Drumm and Washington. This was not the first case where he was caught breaking into a vehicle. He was sentenced yesterday to the maximum sentence, 3 years in jail. This sentence will send a message to those who commit this crime that there are consequences. We will continue to work closely with the District Attorney's office to ensure we put a good case together.

Crimes of Note

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.
(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

*Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Joseph Omran

SAFE engages, educates, and empowers San Franciscans to build safer neighborhoods through crime prevention, education, and public safety services that result in stronger, more vibrant and resilient communities.

Our History

San Francisco SAFE, Inc. (Safety Awareness for Everyone) is a community crime prevention and public safety program that works in cooperation with the San Francisco Police Department and other city agencies to help San Franciscans protect themselves from becoming victims. SAFE was created in 1976 as a project of the SFPD. In 1980, SAFE became a non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation, and 30 years later, continues to act as the crime prevention component of the police department. A major portion of SAFE's income comes from a grant contract with the SFPD, but SAFE also receives donations and grants in order to expand and enhance our crime prevention and public safety services. SAFE has also received numerous grant awards from the City and County of San Francisco, the San Francisco Mayor's Office, State Office of Criminal Justice Planning and local foundations. We have provided major support to the San Francisco Police Department and Mayor's Office by acting as a fiscal agent for these federal and state funded grants, along with participating in numerous crime prevention activities as a part of these grants.

WHAT IS SAFE BIKES

If a bicycle is stolen, even if it is recovered, it is almost impossible to find the owner. Until now. SAFE Bikes is a community collaboration to help reduce bike theft in San Francisco and support bike owners getting their bikes back in the event that their bike is stolen. We have created a bicycle registry to help you get your bike back and to prove that the bike is yours. If your bike is recovered, officers can look up your serial number or registration tag number to return the bike to you. SAFE Bikes also hosts educational workshops and provides valuable information to help you lower the likelihood of your bike getting stolen.

MAN SENTENCED TO MAXIMUM TERM FOR AUTO BURGLARY

San Francisco – Today, District Attorney George Gascón announced that Kristen “Jason” Bell, age 32, of San Francisco, was sentenced yesterday to the maximum term of three years for auto burglary. A jury found Bell guilty on December 19, 2016, of one count of auto burglary and one count of receiving stolen property, both felonies, as well as two misdemeanors for resisting arrest and possession of burglary tools.

“A small number of auto burglars are responsible for the majority of these crimes,” said District Attorney George Gascón.

“Our focus on serial offenders coupled with SFPD’s enhanced enforcement is continuing to yield measurable results, but there’s more work to be done. I strongly urge motorists to remain diligent and avoid leaving any valuables visible in their vehicles. In addition to enhanced enforcement techniques, the community can play a role in ending this epidemic.”

According to court records, on September 26, 2016, Bell broke into a car at Washington and Drumm Street and stole backpacks containing approximately \$3,000 in laptops, electronics, and gift cards. Upon being confronted by the police, Bell attempted to flee but was subsequently arrested when he tripped over his own feet. Bell was charged earlier in 2016 in a different case for nine counts of auto burglary, four counts of possession of stolen property, and five counts of possession of burglary tools. At the time, a judge released Bell over the people’s objection. As such, the September 26, 2016 arrest occurred while the defendant was out of custody. A separate case for those initial charges is still being pursued by SFDA, with the Defendant expected to be back in court on March 1st in Department 20.

SFDA has a specialized strategy for dealing with auto burglary and auto theft cases which recognizes that the vast majority of these crimes are committed by repeat offenders. We vertically prosecute such cases, thereby ensuring there is one prosecutor who takes a case from rebooking all the way through sentencing. This means repeat offenders receive the utmost attention and resources. SFDA has also taken steps to improve collaboration, communication, and training with SFPD in order to increase the charge rate for cases presented to our office. For example, SFDA has worked to ensure SFPD officers are familiar with the prosecution’s burden in proving auto burglary in a court of law, which generally requires evidence that the car was locked, evidence of forced entry, evidence of the intent to steal, and identification of the person who committed the crime. The result of these collaborative efforts has been an increase in our action rate for auto burglaries, which remains at 80%.

In working with our law enforcement partners to obtain these forms of evidence, we have worked with SFPD to ensure any available video evidence is obtained immediately or as soon as possible, that officers check burglarized cars to confirm all doors were locked, and to take pictures to document the scene and the suspect. This information is particularly important if the victim is from out of town, as the prosecution must prove that an auto burglary defendant did not have the right to be in the vehicle. Many visit San Francisco from destinations outside subpoena power, which means establishing the fact that a defendant did not have the legal right to be in the vehicle can be difficult if these steps are not carefully adhered to, and if we have a victim who is unable to return to court to testify.

SFDA and SFPD have also collaborated on a Hot Spot approach, focusing on those areas of the city experiencing the highest concentrations of auto burglary; as well as a focus on serial auto burglars. By focusing on those individuals who disproportionately commit auto burglary, we both reduce the impact of those individuals, and build stronger cases for juries and judges.

“SFPD’s commitment to these cases is bearing fruit,” said SFDA’s vertically assigned auto burglary and auto theft ADA Shirin Oloumi. “San Franciscans deserve relief from these crimes, and they should know that help is on the way.”

The Honorable Judge Benson presided. Special thanks go to SFPD officers Edmund Huang and Derek Christensen for going above and beyond the call of duty during trial, as well as to Leland Chan and Morris Moore of SFDA IT Support. Assistant District Attorney Shirin Oloumi prosecuted the case.

- **STEP 2.** Follow the steps listed here to increase your chances of getting your bicycle returned.
- **STEP 3.** Check the Stolen Bike Registry and Bike Index for your stolen bicycle.



LOCKING TECHNIQUE


- **STEP 1.** Secure rear wheel with small, hardened steel U-lock inside the rear triangle
- **STEP 2.** Make sure U-lock is secured to an immovable object
- **STEP 3.** Secondary metal lock (cable or another U-lock) placed on front wheel
- **STEP 4.** Replace quick release skewers with keyed locking skewers to ensure wheels and saddles are locked to frame.

What is the ALERT Program?

The San Francisco Police Department has developed a volunteer citizen disaster preparedness program. The Auxiliary Law Enforcement Response Team (ALERT) is modeled after and works in partnership with the San Francisco Fire Department's Neighborhood Emergency Response Team (NERT). The ALERT program will train members of the public to assist law enforcement in essential tasks after a major disaster. Such tasks may include: traffic control, foot patrol of business and residential areas, and reporting criminal activity. Volunteers must be at least 16 years of age and live, work, or attend high school in San Francisco.

Three steps to becoming an ALERT volunteer:

1. Complete NERT training and receive certification. To register for NERT training courses please visit www.sfgov.org/sfnert
2. Once NERT certified, forward a copy of your NERT ID card to the ALERT program. sfpdalert@sfgov.org
3. After clearing a basic background check the individual is eligible to register for ALERT training.


