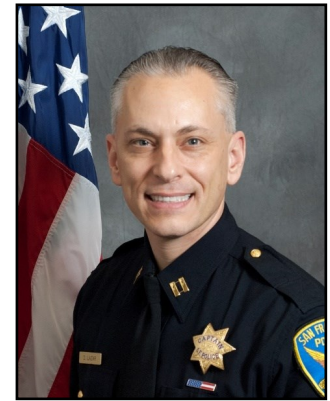

Scam Alert

There were three reports this week of a Craigslist scam of individuals selling an Iphone 6. The seller sells the Iphone and the victim later discovers that it's a "phony" display type phone, not the real phone. In one case, the victim decided to do his own sting operation where he purposely persuaded the suspect to meet him at a subway sandwich place. The suspect produced the phone and the victim held onto it and asked the employees to call 911. The suspect pepper sprayed and assaulted the victim, taking the phony phone back and fleeing. Please do not try this without our assistance!

Great Arrests This Week

I would like to end this week's newsletter acknowledging the great work by the Officers at Central Station.

First, we had a shooting over the weekend on Broadway. The following day, **Officers Romero and Bernardi** captured one of the suspects. On March 4th, there was a vehicle burglarized along the embarcadero. **Officers Richins, Huang and Murphy** pursued the suspect but he got away, fleeing at a high rate of speed over the Bay Bridge to Oakland. These talented Officers were able to use the passwords on the victim's phone to track it to 9th Avenue and Willow in Oakland where they took one suspect into custody. Last night, several juveniles assaulted and robbed a person in Union Square for their I-phone. Most of the suspects were captured by **Officer Schiff and Griffin**.

I read the first of its kind report this week. An Auto Burglary pair where the 53 year old father and 33 year old son were captured by the plainclothes team **Sergeant McDevitt, Officers Richins and Huang** after they broke into a car at 7:15 p.m yesterday at Bay and Mason.
