Great Police Work

I would like to conclude this week's newsletter by highlighting some recent outstanding police work:

On March 8, 2016 at approximately 2:28 a.m., **Officers Srinivas, Battle, Johnson, Zamora and Williams** captured two burglars on the unit block of Green Street. The suspects were captured and were in possession of wire cutters, a crow bar, a grinder and other tools. A great arrest!

On March 19, 2016 at approximately 7:25 p.m., a juvenile was robbed on the 800 block of Jackson. After an extensive investigation lead by **Sergeant Do**, the Juvenile suspects were taken into custody a few days later.

On March 22, 2016 at approximately 1:30 p.m., **Officer Kimberly Ng** arrested a robbery suspect on the 1200 block of Stockton Street. The suspect had taken the victim's wallet and money.

Last, **Officer Tiumalu**, was made aware that an I phone was stolen. The victim was able to indicate via his phone that it was stolen and how it could be returned. The suspect communicated with the victim and said that for \$200, the victim could get his phone back. The suspect attempted to be creative by telling the victim to go to a particular ice cream store, buy an ice cream sandwich and place the \$200 underneath the sandwich. What the suspect did not realize is that the victim would be accompanied by Officers **Tiumalu, Clendenen and Kresley**. The officers and the victim appeared at the store and placed the suspect under arrest. Great police work!

Crimes of Note

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.**

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Officer Darla McBride

Each month Central Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Officer Darla McBride, an 2-year member of Central Police Station.



Officer Darla McBride was born in Butte County in Northern California, where she was raised on a farm. She graduated high school from Tokay High School in Lodi, CA; after graduating she traveled around the states. After traveling the US, she decided to build a house in Murphy's, CA before attending San Francisco State University where she received a Bachelor's Degree in Speech and Communication.

Officer McBride decided to become a police officer after being involved in a fatal head on accident, where her boyfriend was killed. Due to the well trained and knowledgeable medics who arrived on scene, they saved Officer McBride's life, which inspired her to become a first responder.

Officer McBride entered the San Francisco Police Academy in 2001. After graduating from the San Francisco Police Academy, Officer McBride was assigned to Tenderloin Station for field training. After she completed field training, she was assigned to Richmond Station for her probation. When she finished her probation, she was assigned to Southern Station, where she joined the Homeless Outreach team with Captain Lazar. While at Southern Station, Officer McBride worked several different positions, she was a School Resource Officer, the station keeper, and on patrol.

In 2014, she decided to take her transfer to come to Central Station. She was assigned to patrol and is currently our wagon Officer. SAN FRANCISCO PD JOINS NATIONAL CAMPAIGN TO END DISTRACTED DRIVING

SAN FRANCISCO, CA– Distracted driving is such an important safety issue that April is recognized as National Distracted Driving Awareness Month. In California, Police, Sheriff and CHP officials are joining the Office of Traffic Safety, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), and the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), as well as law enforcement throughout the country, working together to focus on education as well as enforcement.

The purpose of the campaign is to raise awareness about the dangers of distracted driving in an attempt to change behavior and save lives, not just in April but also year-round. San Francisco Police Department will join statewide enforcement campaigns on April 7th and 20th, “zero tolerance days,” when all agencies will be especially vigilant for distracted drivers. Although the purpose of the campaign is not to write as many citations as possible, sometimes citations are necessary for drivers to understand the importance of focusing on their driving.

Distracted driving continues to be a problem, especially as the use of Smartphones increase. Although such crashes are often difficult to prove, California had at least 84 fatal distracted driving collisions in 2013, 85 in 2014 and 67 in 2015, with the actual number of cases likely higher. The number of injury collisions for the same three-year period shows an increase: 10,078 in 2013; 10,463 in 2014, and 11,023 in 2015. NHTSA data for 2014 show nationwide, 3,179 people died in distracted driving collisions, which is 10 per cent of all crash fatalities. An additional 431,000 people, or 18 per cent, were injured in motor vehicle collisions involving distracted drivers.

“As we rely on our cell phones more and more in our everyday lives, we seem to be kidding ourselves in thinking that they don’t affect our driving,” said OTS Director Rhonda Craft.

“Crashes are up. The scientific evidence is solid. The dangers are real, and they apply to all of us. We need to silence the distractions.”

The problem of distracted driving is significant, and no surprise to drivers day in and day out. The Department Of Transportation notes that at any given moment, during daylight hours, more than 660,000 vehicles are being driven by someone using a hand-held cellphone.

NHTSA will conduct a television campaign in April with the message “U Drive. U Text. U Pay.” OTS will produce public service announcements and conduct a social media campaign urging drivers to “Silence the Distraction.”

WHAT IS DISTRACTED DRIVING?

Distracted driving is any activity that could divert a person’s attention away from the primary task of driving. All distractions endanger driver, passenger, and bystander safety. These types of distractions include:

- Texting
- Using a cellphone or smartphone
- Eating and drinking
- Talking to passengers
- Grooming
- Reading, including maps
- Using a navigation system
- Watching a video
- Adjusting a radio, CD player, or MP3 player

But, because text messaging requires visual, manual, and cognitive attention from the driver, it is by far the most alarming distraction.



The Police Officer Testing Components:

- A multiple choice written examination that measures basic reading and writing abilities.
- A physical ability examination that measures strength, endurance, equilibrium and flexibility.

Checklist for starting the selection process:

- Report by 8:00 AM to the testing site.
- Applicants will be processed on a first come first serve basis.
- You will be required to report with a valid driver license.
- If you have taken the POST written in the last two years, bring a copy of the proof with you.
- If you have a current POST Basic Certificate, bring a copy with you.
- If you wish to claim Veteran's Preference, bring a copy of your DD214 with you.
- Allow two to four hours to complete the required paper work.

Highlights of the Accelerated Hiring Program:

- You will no longer have to submit an application before the test!
- The City will conduct tests on a monthly basis. You simply attend the session which is most convenient for you. Please bring a valid driver license when you report.
- At the site, you will complete a short job application, take the POST written examination, and complete the Personal History Questionnaire (PHQ) which is the first stage in the background investigation process.
- The POST test will be waived for those who have taken it within the last two years and have achieved a score of 42 or higher. However, you will still need to complete an application and attend a PHQ session. Bring a copy of documentation which includes the date you completed the POST test and your score.
- Also, if you have a current California POST Basic, Intermediate or Advanced Certificate the written test will be waived. Bring a copy of the certificate to the test site. You will still need to complete an application and attend a PHQ session.
- If you pass the POST written examination, your name will be placed on the official Civil Service tentative eligible list. Your eligibility is valid for two years.
- SFPD will evaluate the results of the PHQ and invite the most suitable candidates to participate in the physical ability and departmental interview.


