Fisherman's Wharf is one of the destinations that tourists visit most in San Francisco. As the crowds arrive, so do the incidents of theft, auto burglaries and basic quality of life issues.

When I arrived at Central Station, there was only one officer assigned to Fisherman's Wharf. This was **Officer John Van Koll**. Since then, I added three additional officers for the wharf who work from 11:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Thanks to the Mayor's Office and the Board of Supervisors, the Department has been hiring officers. As a result, new officers have arrived at the station.

Because of this, I just added additional officers to Fisherman's Wharf who will work 2:00 p.m. to midnight, 7 days a week. This is the first time Fisherman's Wharf has seen officers on foot later in the evening in over 3 years. They had a successful first day yesterday addressing issues late into the evening. I look forward to great results!

Crimes of Note

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault** is when a person swings their arm and **battery** is when that arm makes contact with another person.

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

- Be at least 20 years of age. You will need to be 21 years old before starting the academy.

- Have a valid driver license to operate an automobile.

The Police Officer Testing Components:

- A multiple choice written examination that measures basic reading and writing abilities.
- A physical ability examination that measures strength, endurance, equilibrium and flexibility.
- An oral interview that tests oral communication, problem solving and interpersonal skills.
- Candidates who pass the three part Police Officer examination process move on to the background investigation process. The background investigation process consists of:
 - Personal History Questionnaire
 - Employment-character-background investigation
 - Psychological evaluation
 - Polygraph examination
 - Medical examination that includes a vision test, a hearing test and height/weight measurements.

- If you wish to claim Veteran's Preference, bring a copy of your DD214 with you.
- Allow two to four hours to complete the required paper work.

Highlights of the Accelerated Hiring Program:

- You will no longer have to submit an application before the test!
- The City will conduct tests on a monthly basis. You simply attend the session which is most convenient for you. Please bring a valid driver license when you report.
- At the site, you will complete a short job application, take the POST written examination, and complete the Personal History Questionnaire (PHQ) which is the first stage in the background investigation process.
- The POST test will be waived for those who have taken it within the last two years and have achieved a score of 42 or higher. However, you will still need to complete an application and attend a PHQ session. Bring a copy of documentation which includes the date you completed the POST test and your score.
- Also, if you have a current California POST Basic, Intermediate or Advanced Certificate the written test will be waived. Bring a copy of the certificate to the test site. You will still need to complete an application and attend a PHQ session.
- If you pass the POST written examination, your name will be placed on the official Civil Service tentative eligible list. Your eligibility is valid for two years.
- SFPD will evaluate the results of the PHQ and invite the most suitable candidates to participate in the physical ability and departmental interview.
- If you are invited to the physical ability and departmental interview, but cannot attend, you will not be eliminated from consideration. Like the written test, the physical ability and departmental interviews will be held every month. This means you can attend a later session.
- If you have problems passing the physical ability, you won't be eliminated. This means you can increase your physical conditioning, come back, and try again. We want you to be successful in the process.


