Crimes of Note

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.**

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grant Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Featured Citizen of the Month

Stephanie Greenburg

Each month Central Police Station features a citizen who represents the unique flavor of the Central Police District.

This month we interviewed Stephanie Greenburg. Stephanie is on the Central Community Police Advisory Board.



Stephanie Greenburg has lived in North Beach/Telegraph Hill for nearly 20 years. She grew up in Utah, and has lived in New York City and Indiana, where she attended graduate school. A committed neighborhood advocate, she has been actively involved in a number of community efforts and organizations. Stephanie joined the Central Community Police Advisory Board (CPAB) in 2011, representing the south side of North Beach inclusive of the Broadway Corridor. She has served under four Station Captains and has acted as Co-chair for the past 4 years. Recently, Stephanie helped to organize two highly successful and well attended National Night Out events, and has worked on the CPAB's Park Smart and Graffiti Subcommittees. In 2013, Stephanie was appointed by Supervisor David Chiu to the Graffiti Advisory Board, representing District 3. Here, Stephanie served on the Law Enforcement subcommittee and worked with Supervisor London Breed's office on new graffiti legislation passed by the Board of Supervisors in 2014.

A long-time advocate for positive change in the Broadway Corridor area, Stephanie joined efforts to form the Top of Broadway Community Benefit District (ToBCBD) in 2010, and has served as the organization's Board President and Marketing Chair since it's formation in 2013. Beginning in 2011, Stephanie joined other community members, as well as city officials and agencies, in collaborative efforts to improve public safety. This endeavor to improve safety and quality of life in the greater Broadway-area has continued with the combined efforts of Central Station and the ToBCBD's Safety & Services Committee, of which Stephanie is a member.

Brazen Child Abduction Suspect Taken Into Custody

At approximately 10:00AM on Tuesday, November 17, 2015, a mother and her 2-year old son had boarded a muni bus on the 600 block of Sansome Street. While waiting to receive a transfer slip from the bus operator, a man identified as 45-year old Sudesh Singh of Oakland, quickly entered the bus and forcibly took the 2-year old child who had been standing next to his mother. Upon taking the child, Singh began to walk away northbound on Sansome Street. The mother screamed and quickly exited the bus confronting Singh who was holding her crying son. The mother pulled the child away from Singh and then re-boarded the bus so that she could continue on to her intended destination. The child appeared to be physically unharmed.

Later that evening, the mother's sister learned of the abduction and contacted the San Rafael Police Department who then referred her to the San Francisco Police Department. Investigators from the SFPD Special Victim's Unit (SVU) were assigned to this abduction and they were able to obtain video footage of the event. The investigators were then able to identify Singh when it was learned that Singh had been contacted by officers from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security who had earlier detained him on the 600 block of Sansome for acting suspiciously.

San Francisco Police SVU investigators issued a crime alert to local law enforcement agencies with Singh's information and a description of the event. In the early morning hours of November 20th, Singh was contacted by Bay Area Rapid Transit (BART) police officers at the San Francisco International Airport BART Station. These officers recognized Singh from the crime alert and immediately detained him. San Francisco Police investigators responded to the airport and placed him under arrest.

Singh was subsequently booked into the San Francisco County Jail for felony kidnapping and child endangerment. A booking photo was not available at the time of the press release.

**Armed Robbery Crew, "Green Glove Bandits" Arrested by
San Francisco Police**

On November 19, 2015, the San Francisco Police Department's Special Investigations Division arrested "The Green Gloved Bandits." So named because of the gloves they wore during the robberies, The Green Glove Bandits are suspected of committing over 20 armed robberies throughout the greater San Francisco Bay Area since May 2015. The Bandits are suspected of committing at least six armed robberies in San Francisco.

The SFPD Special Investigations Division had been conducting an around the clock surveillance of the robbery crew. On November 19th, the Bandits committed an armed robbery of a gas station on the 2100 block of Orchard in San Leandro. The Bandits were then taken into custody by San Francisco Police Officers from the following units: Special Investigations Division, Tactical Unit, Major Crimes Division, Gang Task Force, Northern Police Station Street Crimes Unit, Narcotics Division, and Tenderloin Station Investigative Team.

LaCarl Dow, male, 44 of San Leandro and Namon Taylor, male, 37 of San Francisco were booked into the Alameda County Jail on robbery charges. While an arrest was made, this is an ongoing investigation that will require coordination by law enforcement in various jurisdictions. No booking photo will be released due to pending identification matters. Checklist for starting the selection process:

- Report by 8:00 AM to the testing site.
- Applicants will be processed on a first come first serve basis.
- You will be required to report with a valid driver license.
- If you have taken the POST written in the last two years, bring a copy of the proof with you.
- If you have a current POST Basic Certificate, bring a copy with you.
- If you wish to claim Veteran's Preference, bring a copy of your DD214 with you.
- Allow two to four hours to complete the required paper work.

Highlights of the Accelerated Hiring Program:

- You will no longer have to submit an application before the test!
- The City will conduct tests on a monthly basis. You simply attend the session which is most convenient for you. Please bring a valid driver license when you report.
- At the site, you will complete a short job application, take the POST written examination, and complete the Personal History Questionnaire (PHQ) which is the first stage in the background investigation process.
- The POST test will be waived for those who have taken it within the last two years and have achieved a score of 42 or higher. 
