SantaCon

Saturday is SantaCon in the City. It starts out as a fundraiser and toy drive in Union Square however, thousands of people dress like Santa and go to the bars and drink. I will have extra coverage in North Beach on Saturday to address public intoxication. Officers will enforce public intoxication and criminal activity. This year, I have partnered with the Department of Public Health and North Beach Neighbors by establishing a satellite sobering center in the neighborhood. For those who are intoxicated, friendly and cooperative, they will have an opportunity to spend time with the Public Health Staff instead of the staff at County Jail.

Polar Plunge

Central Station Officers raised \$500 for the Make A Wish Foundation. Last Saturday, we also participated as "Team Central" in a 5k Run, Polar Plunge in the bay at Aquatic Park and a Cable Car pull competition. I have been participating for several years. The water was very cold!

Great Police Work

On December 5, 2015, **Officer Joseph Marte** prepared an incident report from a Russian Hill resident who had their packages stolen. There was a video of the incident. Officer Marte viewed the video and immediately recognized the suspect as someone he stopped on November 28, 2015 who was looking into parked cars on the 1000 block of Union Street. Because of Officer Marte's outstanding skills, the suspect was identified.

The following day, **Officers Marte and Thomas Cunnane** (featured Officer of the Month) went to look for the suspect and found him. They arrested him. He was in possession of burglary tools, jewelry, a remote control, and methamphetamine. A great arrest!

On December 2, 2015, **Officers Anthony Randolph and Riley Bandy** saw a person who appeared to be casing vehicles and locked bicycles on Sansome Street. They stopped and spoke with him, he told the Officers, "Come on man, I haven't stolen any bikes since the last time you arrested me. " Officers located a pair of bolt cutters, wrench, plyers, screw driver, bicycle chain and grinder in his possession. He was arrested.

Crimes of Note

Definitions

Robbery – Robbery is the taking of property from another by using force or by using fear.

Assault – An assault is an unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on another person.

Battery - (Misdemeanor battery) is any willful and unlawful touching of another.

(Felony battery) is the use of force or violence upon the person of another that causes serious bodily injury.

***Assault is when a person swings their arm and battery is when that arm makes contact with another person.**

Aggravated Assault – Assault upon another person with a deadly weapon or instrument other than a firearm or by any means of force likely to produce great bodily injury.

Burglary – The intent upon entry into a property to commit grand theft, petty theft, or any felony.

Grand Theft – Grand theft is theft committed when the value of the money, labor, or property taken exceeds \$950.

Petty Theft – Theft where the value of the property taken is less than \$950.

Officer Thomas Cunnane

Each month Central Police Station features one of its officers in an effort to learn more about the men and women who police our neighborhood. This month, we interviewed Officer Thomas Cunnane, a 8-year member of Central Police Station.



Officer Thomas Cunnane is the grandson of Irish immigrants. Officer Cunnane was born in San Francisco, CA; he grew up in San Francisco and attended Saint Ignatius High School. After High School, Officer Cunnane joined the US Army where he was a tank driver for three years. Officer Cunnane is still a San Francisco resident, and has raised his kids in the city.

When Officer Cunnane returned from serving his country, he joined the SFPD Airport Bureau. Officer Cunnane worked at the airport from 1980-1997, during that time Officer Cunnane was part of the SWAT Team and was also a Field Training Officer. In 1997 Officer Cunnane decided to teach defensive tactics and officer safety at the Police Academy. Officer Cunnane taught at the Police Academy until 2007. Officer Cunnane has trained many recruits and Officers in the ten years that he was at the academy.

After ten years of teaching, Officer Cunnane decided to leave the academy and come to Central Station. Officer Cunnane has walked a foot beat in Union Square for the last nine years. You can often see Officer Cunnane in the area of Union Square with his service cap and hear his cheerful laugh.

San Francisco Police Warn Against Mail Scam

San Francisco Police are warning the public of a mail scam. In this scam, the victim will receive a priority mail envelope via the U.S. Postal Service with a letter inside.

The letter reads that the recipient had been selected as a mystery shopper and gives instructions on how the program works. Also inside is a check in the amount of several thousands of dollars. In our incident the amount was for \$2,890. The instructions asked the recipient to deposit the money into their bank account and deduct \$200 for completing the assignment. It then stated to wire the \$2,690 via Western Union and use \$90 for transfer fees. The way this works is the recipient deposits the check into their bank account. This fraudulent check will not clear due to insufficient funds. The recipient is then responsible for the amount of the check, meanwhile the money wired earlier will have been successfully transferred.

If you have received such notice/letter you are asked to call your local police and report the incident online or call US Postal Police Inspectors at 1-877-876-2455. Do not cash the check. There has not been any cases in SF, however this was sent to one of our own employees.

Safe Shopper 2015 - Holiday Season Safety Tips

"The Mayor and SFPD want everyone to have a safe holiday shopping season. We also want all gifts to reach those they are intended for. With that in mind, here are some tips that will help accomplish both. Happy Holidays," said Chief Suhr.

During this holiday season, the Police Department will be working to enhance safety for residents, visitors, and shoppers. There will be increased foot patrols to shopping areas throughout the city, including the horse/mounted unit, plain clothes officers, and traffic enforcement.

- Remain alert when using electronic devices.
- Help avoid vehicle break-ins, leave nothing visible in your car
- Move your vehicle to a different location each time you load packages in the trunk.
- Try to park in a lot where there is an attendant.
- Always be alert to your surroundings.
- Have your keys in your hand as you approach your vehicle.
- Do not overburden yourself with packages and other items.
- Keep packages locked in your trunk while shopping.
- Shop with a companion, especially after dark, whenever possible.
- Keep wallets in hard-to-reach places, your front pocket for example.
- Be wary of anyone causing a distraction in close-quartered places, such as on public transit.
- Carry only the cash and credit cards that you will need.
- Keep cash separate from ID and credit cards.
- Do not carry your passport or social security card.
- If someone demands your purse or wallet, surrender it as resisting may result in bodily harm.



The CENTRAL DISTRICT commences at a point on the water north of where Mission St. intersects with The Embarcadero and proceeding west on Mission St. (excluding both sides) to 3rd St.; north on 3rd St. (including both sides) to Market St.; west on Market St. (excluding both sides) to Powell St.; north on Powell St. (including both sides) to Geary St.; west on Geary St. (including both sides) to Larkin St.; north on Larkin St. (including both sides) to Bay St.; west on Bay St. (including both sides) to Van Ness Ave.; north on Van Ness Ave. (including both sides), and continuing north on the Municipal Pier Access Road (including both sides) to a point on the water just west of the Municipal Pier; east and south from a point on the water just west of the Municipal Pier, following the shoreline, to the origin at a point on the water north of where Mission St. intersects with The Embarcadero.
