****The officers of Northern Station work hard each and every day to keep the streets safe for everyone. They are making some excellent arrests. Here is a **small snapshot** of what they are doing. I encourage you to log on to the SFPD website and under 'compstat' you will find a link to 'crime maps' that will provide very timely crime information and a greater accounting.**

Battery, Malicious Mischief, 3601 Lyon Street, 5-14-16 1640hrs

Officers responded to the Palace of Fine Arts regarding a fight between two males. When the officers arrived they separated both males and questioned them. One of the males stated he was walking in the park with his wife taking pictures of the swans. He said the second male walked up to him and told him to leave the swans alone. The two males got into an argument and started to fight each other. The second male took the camera off of the other male and threw it into the pond. The officers interviewed both males who had different stories on who hit who first. There were no other witnesses to the incident. The officers asked both parties if they wanted to sign a citizen's arrest form against each other and they both said no. The first male stated that he would not press any charges as long as the second male pays for a new camera. The second male agreed and they exchanged information. Both parties had visible injuries to their face and arms, but refused any medical attention. The officers took photos of the injuries and provided both parties with follow up forms.

[Trespassing, Methamphetamine Offense, 900blk Eddy St, 5-14-16 1325hrs](#)

Officers were on routine patrol when they were dispatched to the above area regarding a trespasser. The officers met with the 911 caller who told them that an unknown male had entered the secured apartment complex and doesn't live there. The 911 caller gave the officers a good description and within minutes the officers located the suspect. The officers asked the 911 caller if they have the correct person and he told them yes. The officers observed the suspect who was shaking and was unable to make eye contact with them when they were questioning him. The suspect showed obvious signs of someone who was under the influence. The officers asked the suspect if he took any narcotics and the suspect told them that he did meth within the hour. The officers believed the suspect was under the influence of a controlled substance and took custody of him. During a search of the suspect's person the officers located a plastic sealed bag of suspected methamphetamine and heroin. The 911 caller signed a citizen's arrest form for trespassing and the officers transported the suspect to Northern Station. The officers did a computer check and learned the suspect was on probation for assault. After a thorough investigation the suspect was transported to County Jail for booking.

[Battery, Alcohol, Under the influence in public place, Fillmore/Greenwich,5-15-16 1705hrs](#)

Officers were on uniform patrol and in the area due to large crowds that spilled over from the Bay to Breakers event. A citizen informed the officers that there was a large fight on the corner of Fillmore and Greenwich Street. The officers responded and requested additional back up. The officers saw that security from the East Side West bar was attempting to put handcuffs on a subject. The officers stepped in and took custody of the subject and to investigate what was going on. The security told the officers that the subject was intoxicated and was blocking the doorway to their entrance. The security asked him to move several times, but refused. After a brief argument the subject punched the security guard in the nose causing him to bleed. Then other security guards arrived to assist and that is when the officers showed up. While the officers were investigating the incident the suspect's girlfriend showed up who was also intoxicated. The girlfriend tried to intervene and kicked one of the officers in the leg. The officers took custody of her for public intoxication and another unit transported her to County Jail. The SFFD Medics arrived and determined that the suspect needed to go to the hospital for his injuries and due to his level of intoxication. The officers accompanied the medics to the hospital. The officers released the suspect to the hospital staff for treatment and detox.

[Cocaine, Possession for Sale, Eddy/Larkin, 5-18-16 1837hrs](#)

Officers were on uniform patrol and in the area due to the fact the San Francisco Police Department has conducted numerous criminal investigations in this area for drug sales and drug use, robberies, and violent assaults. The officer's immediate attention was focused on two males who were standing mid-block on the sidewalk. One of the males was a transient subject sitting on a bike and he was looking into the palm of the other male. The suspect with his hand open was looking up and down the block and acting very nervous. The suspect spotted the officers and looked directly at them. The suspect turned away quickly and started to walk away. The officers drove ahead of him and the suspect then turned around and walked away in order to avoid the officers. Then the officers saw the suspect put something in his mouth. Based on the officer's observations and experience they believed the suspects were actively engaging in a hand to hand drug sale as a dealer. The officers stopped and detained the suspect who had suspected narcotics in his hand or mouth and placed him into handcuffs. The suspect opened his mouth and the officers saw two clear plastic twist baggies containing an off white rock like substance. The officers recognized the substance to be a usable amount of cocaine base

packaged for sales. The officers were unable to locate the transient suspect. The suspect was transported to Northern Station for further investigation. The officers learned the suspect was from Honduras and moved to Oakland six days ago from the above date. The suspect told the officers he came to San Francisco to sell drugs. After a thorough investigation the suspect was later booked at County Jail.

Warrant Arrest, Traffic Violation, 1200 Blk Polk Street, 5-21-16 0731hrs

Officers were on uniform patrol in the area of Bush and Polk Street when they observed a female subject jay walk directly in front of the officers. The officers stopped and detained the subject for the violation. The officers did a computer check on the subject which revealed she had an outstanding warrant for her arrest. The officers confirmed the warrant out on the field and placed the subject under arrest. The officers transported the subject to County Jail where she was booked accordingly.

Domestic Violence Information

The San Francisco Police Department's Special Victims Unit (SVU) is a centralized police investigative unit located at the Hall of Justice- 850 Bryant Street, Room # 500. A staff of inspectors at the SVU reviews 350 to 400 incident reports of domestic violence each month.

The SVU investigates all felony arrest cases involving abuse committed against any person, who is a spouse, former spouse, cohabitant, former cohabitant, in a current or former dating relationship, in a current or former engagement, or have a child in common. This includes boyfriend/girlfriend and same sex relationships. The SVU also investigates elder abuse cases (neglect and physical) and stalking cases.

All non-arrest reports are also reviewed by the SVU. The SVU Inspectors telephone every victim in an attempt to advise her/him about follow-up procedures and referrals. A message is left if voice mail is available. **It is important to note that attempts are made to contact all victims in every domestic violence, elder abuse and/or stalking case. Likewise, no SFPD domestic violence report is "just filed". All reports are reviewed; computer checks on alleged suspects for parole/probation violations are completed; victim notifications are conducted and the results of all of the work are logged.** The SVU works closely with Victim Services, Adult Protective Services, and Safe Start I. If you are a victim or know someone who is a victim of domestic violence, please contact the SFPD's Special Victims Unit at 415.553.9227. In an emergency, dial 911. Please be safe and remember that reporting domestic violence doesn't just assist the victim but the victim's family as well.

Text-a-Tip Set Up Instructions

Non-Blackberry Cellular Telephones: Dial 847411-then **SAVE** this to your phone contacts as a mobile number. Name this new contact **TIP411**. Now the number is ready to be used to send text messages. When sending a message, **type SFPD then leave a space**. Type your **Message** and **Send**. You will receive a reply message in seconds.

Blackberry telephones: Similar to above. First you need to add TIP411 to your mobile contact list. Select TIP411 enter. The cursor will be in blue on the #8 (847411). Click the ball and select **SMS TEXT TIP411**. Type your message starting with **SFPD (space) ... then send**. You will receive a response within seconds.

EARTHQUAKE SAFETY TIPS

During the Earthquake:

- If you are indoors, stay there. Quickly move to a safe location in the room such as under a strong desk, a strong table, or along an interior wall. The goal is to protect you from falling objects and be located near the structural strong points of the room. Avoid taking cover near windows, large mirrors, hanging objects, heavy furniture, heavy appliances or fireplaces.
- If you are cooking, turn off the stove and take cover.
- If you are outdoors, move to an open area where falling objects are unlikely to strike you. Move away from buildings, power lines and trees.
- If you are driving, slow down smoothly and stop on the side of the road. Avoid stopping on or under bridges and overpasses, or under power lines, trees and large signs. Stay in your car.

After the Earthquake:

- Check for injuries if needed, help ensure the safety of people around you.
- Check for damage. If your building is badly damaged you should leave it until it has been inspected by a safety professional.
- If you smell or hear a gas leak, get everyone outside and open windows and doors. If you can do it safely, turn off the gas at the meter. Report the leak to the Gas Company and Fire Department. Do not use any electrical appliances because a tiny spark could ignite the gas.
- If the power is out, unplug major appliances to prevent possible damage when the power is turned back on. If you see sparks, frayed wires, or smell hot insulation turn off electricity at the main fuse box or breaker. If you will have to step in water to turn off the electricity you should call a professional to turn it off for you.

311 Customer Service Center:

What is 311? 311 is a toll free, **NON-EMERGENCY** phone number that the public can call to access information about government services. A live customer service representative will be available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year. The service is available to both wired and wireless customers. Wireless customers should call (415) 701-2311. 311 employees will be able to provide translations services in more than 145 languages and dialects and will employ a diverse staff of customer service representatives. Once your complaint is logged you will be given a tracking number to follow up on at a later date. Additionally, 311 are set up to accept calls from the hearing impaired by utilizing a TTY System. **Note:** 3-1-1 now has a victim's services website: <http://sfvictimservices.org> for more information.

How does 911 work on cell phones in San Francisco?

If you are on **surface streets** in San Francisco and dial 911, your call will be answered by the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management. Once the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management determines what emergency services are needed, they will then process your call.

If you are on a **freeway** in San Francisco and dial 911, your call will be answered by either by the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management Services or the California Highway Patrol Dispatch Center. Regardless, your 911 call will be routed to the proper emergency agency, the San Francisco Police Department, the California Highway Patrol, or the San Francisco Fire Department, including ambulance service.
